Formed in April 2007, Duniya Dance and Drum Company creates dance and music from Punjab, India, and Guinea, West Africa, as well as unique blends of these forms and beyond. The word duniya means "world" in a wide array of languages, including Punjabi, Arabic, Susu and Wolof. Duniya's work embodies this word, as it explores the forces that have brought together the members of the company and their dance and drum styles, including, but not limited to, colonization, globalization, immigration, art, dance, music and love.





HALF AND HALVES







This show explores the little-known cultural and artistic legacies of early 20th century California's Punjabi-Mexican communities inspired the collaboration between Bhangra dancer/choreographer Joti Singh, with her company Duniya Dance & Drum Company, and Mexican folkloric dancer/choreographer Zenon Barron of Ensambles Ballet Folklorico de San Francisco.

This production uses live dance and music, spoken word, and video to explore the coming together of Punjabi and Mexican agricultural workers in California's central valleys. In the early 20th century, men from Punjab, India moved to California primarily to work on farms. Because of discriminatory immigration laws, they could not bring wives from India, so many married Mexican women with whom they worked. The Mexican women saw marriage with these men as a way out of poverty. The children of these unions were known derisively as "Half and Halves."

The 90-minute performance brings together Bhangra - a high-energy harvest and celebration dance from Punjab, India - and Mexican Folkloric dance and music in order to explore the complex dynamics of immigration, discrimination, and shared communities.

In the early 1900's, Joti Singh's great-grandfather lived in San Francisco and was the president of the Ghadar Party, a political party fighting for the independence of India from the British. Blood and Ink overlaps the political action of the Ghadar Party, with present-day activism; linking the Ghadar party's strategic diversity with today's uniting of minority movements. The performance uses Bhangra dance, music, and spoken-word to explore its themes.




TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS



PREFERRED STAGE DIMENSIONS: 25' to 40' wide and 25' to 35' deep

FLOOR: Dancers perform barefoot, so preferred performance surfaces are marley or wood (free of protruding nail heads and splinters)

SOUND AND LIGHT: Duniya Dance and Drum does not travel with a Technical Director, sound system and lighting needs to be provided at the venue



THE DIRECTORS

Artistic Director

Joti Singh is a dance creator and dance innovator, sprung from the U.S. American south to parents from northern India. She is the Artistic Director of Duniya Dance and Drum Company. Joti began her dance training in Punjabi circles, carrying through her body the culture that's in her blood and memory. As an adult, West African dance entered Joti's purview, transforming her body's culture. Through this multilingual body, Joti explores where history intertwines with contemporary continuities of celebration and injustice. She has created works such as "Half and Halves," about the Punjabi-Mexican communities of California with collaborator Zenon Barron, and "The Madness of the Elephant," about Guinea's first president, Sekou Toure. Joti has received funding from the Creative Work Fund, the San Francisco Arts Commission, Dancers' Group's New Stages, the Alliance for California Traditional Arts, and the American India Foundation. She participated in the CHIME mentorship program and has been an Artist-in-Residence at CounterPULSE twice, most recently in their Performing Diaspora program. During this residency, Joti created the piece "Red, Saffron and Green," about the Gadar Party, based in San Francisco in the early 20th century, fighting for India's independence from Britain.

Joti and her husband, musician Bongo Sidibe, lead annual trips to Guinea and recently opened the Duniya Center for Arts and Education in Conakry. She teaches all over the SF Bay Area, including Dance Mission Theater and the San Francisco School of the Arts. Joti holds an MA in South Asian Studies from UC Berkeley and a BA in English from Reed College.

ALPHA OUMAR "BONGO" SIDIBE



THE DIRECTORS

Music Director

Alpha Oumar "Bongo" Sidibe is a traditional drummer from Conakry, Guinea in West Africa. He is Musical Director of Duniya Dance and Drum Company. Bongo studied with Master Drummer Mamady Keita at his school, Tam Tam Mandigue, Guinea, and participated in his workshops in Conakry and Balandougou, Mamady's village. He performed with Ballet Jah Karlo in Dakar, Senegal, and recorded the CD "N'dguel Fall" and toured with Orchestre Baye Fall. Before leaving Guinea, he was co-director of Balandougou Kan, a group of traditional percussionists and dancers. Since arriving in the U.S., Bongo has performed with Rhythm Village, Joan Baez, Mickey Hart, the Grateful Dead, and Black Nature from the Sierra Leone Refugee Allstars. He is also the founder and lead singer of the international reggae group Wontanara.


